A Glimpse at Arizona's Past

What better way to glimpse Arizona's past than to experience it on a road trip this summer. April's True West Magazine has showcased three routes to choose:

Up Wickenburg Way through mining and ranching country to the tall pines of Prescott. See what's left of Vulture City, a ghost town where gold was discovered in 1863 by Henry Wickenburg and once sported a population of thousands. Don't miss the Desert Caballeros Museum and the Jail Tree, or the Visitors Center in the 1896 Santa Fe Depot.

State Rt. 89 passes through Congress and Yarnell with good stops to eat on its way to Prescott. Make time in Prescott to visit Sharlot Hall, and the Territorial Governor's Mansion and the army fort and gold mining district. If you go for the 4th of July, you'll be there for Prescott's Frontier Days Parade and World's Oldest Rodeo.

Known as The Gateway to the Grand Canyon, Williams was named after Bill Williams, a fur trapper and mountain man who was killed by the Ute Indians in 1849. He's represented by an 8ft. sculpture at the Monument Park there. From Williams, late 1850s travel followed the Beale Wagon Road west. In 1882 the Atlantic & Pacific RR continued alongside the Beale as did the Old Trails Highway and later, Route 66. Historic Seligman merits a stopover as you follow 66 along one of the longest remaining stretches of Route 66, then to Grand Canyon Caverns' 200 ft. underground experience. Other trendy and interesting stops at Peach Springs and Hackberry General store are worthwhile before you reach Kingman's great museum's and nostalgic glitter of Route 66. From there the Mother Road gets a little windy and narrow through Oatman, famous for Clark Gable and Carole Lombard's honeymoon spot in 1939 and its burros that roam the streets, descendants of those abandoned by early day miners.

Our southeast cattle country at Willcox is the next destination where you'll find remnants of Apache history, a 140 year old redwood structured train depot, now serving as the town hall, and museums honoring Cochise County, Indian history, and singers Rex Allen and Marty Robbins. West from there is Tombstone—The Town To Tough to Die—then on to Bisbee, the Queen of the Copper Camp. There's so much to tell and see, you'll need to pick up a brochure or go online.

Enjoy your glimpse through some of Arizona's history this summer but allow plenty of time!

The Big Race

Grandpa and I were at Anderson's Hardware getting stuff to fix the gate that our old bull had torn up when I saw the poster declaring the Big Soap Derby just two weeks away. Right beside the poster was a box with the Official Rules; I stuck one in my pocket. I pulled it out and read it on the way home, then threw it on the seat. Grandpa looked down at it and said, "That's going to be a good race. We will want to go watch it."

I didn't want to watch it, I wanted to be in it. But, once I read the rules, I knew that was not going to happen. You had to have this certain kind of wheels that I had seen at the hardware store for \$8 a set. I didn't have \$8 and I knew Grandpa didn't.

Monday at lunch Billy Thornton and I were discussing the race and how much we would like to be in it. Our school custodian, Mr. Gillet said, "I heard you boys talking about the race. Are you going to run in it?"

"Naw, it costs too much, we can't do it." I couldn't keep my bottom lip from pushin' out.

"I know how that is. See ya later." He ambled off, shaking his head and mumbling.

After school Billy was at our place helping dig post holes. Grandpa paid us ten cents a hole. They had to be eighteen inches deep and he measured each one before he paid us. We looked up to see Mr. Gillet's old pickup pull up to the barn where Grandpa was standing. I didn't think much about it, you see. Mr. Gillet owned the farm next to us and Grandpa share-cropped it with him. The two of them had been friends forever. I remember Grandpa telling how Mr. Gillet's wife had died and just two weeks later his son had been killed (he and my Dad had gone down on the same ship.) Well Mr. Gillet had kind of gone off the deep end and stayed drunk for most of a year. When he sobered up, he worked a deal with Grandpa to work his farm and then get the job at the school.

The reason my sister and I were being raised by our grandparents was when my dad died, my mother brought Sue and I over to them, then went to town and got totally drunk and stepped out in front of a

car. So, here we stayed and I think my grandparents were glad to have us especially since I was big enough to help around the farm now.

I was a little surprised when Grandpa called us over to them. You see back then, kids didn't get to hear the grownups discuss business or much else. When we were standing before them, Grandpa said, "I hear you boys want to be in the race. Well, it seems Tony here has a derby car in his barn and if you boys want to do the work of getting it out of the rafters and cleaning it up, he thinks it would be alright for you to use it. But, after the race, you have to put it back where you got it. Billy and I were both 12 but the way we acted you'd have thought we were six! We jumped up and own and hollered, "YES, YES, YES!"

Now when he said rafters, that's just what he meant. It looked mighty small up there, but when we finally lowered it to the floor, it was long and sleek... and covered with years of dirt. We got it into Mr. Gillet's truck and took it to our place.

When it was in our barn and Mr. Gillet had been properly thanked, Grandpa said, "You boys will have to clean it and paint it and grease the wheels but that won't happen until the post holes are dug. Well, it had been taking a half hour for us to dig a hole, but all of a sudden it took only fifteen minutes. Wednesday after school, we finished the last post hole and went to work on that wonderful car.

I look back on that time and realize what a wonderful time in my life it was. You'd think sanding and painting and being covered with grease would not be fun. But it was the greatest thing ever.

When race day came, Billy and I drew straws to see who would get to drive . . . and wouldn't you know, Billy won. That was alright, he had as much right to it as I did. Well, we did not win, but we came in second so it was a great day.

Now, some twenty years later that little car still sets in the rafters of my barn. You see, Mr. Gillet left me his place and my sister got my grandparents' place. And, Billy has his parents' place. He and I still talk about the Great Race of 1952.
